Editor's Report:

Capt. Eddy Resigns from WBKB

Captain Bill Eddy, for nine years head of Balaban & Katz Television in Chicago, has resigned as head of WBKB. He is now president of Television Associates, a firm which manufactures and markets television equipment under Eddy patents.

Though the move was one which he long anticipated, Captain Eddy's primary interests being in the scientific development of the television and electronic fields, the resignation announcement came as a distinct shock to people within the trade, as well as to television onlookers.

The editors of *Television Forecast* are in accord with the high tribute paid to Bill Eddy by Jack Mabley in a recent column in the *Chicago Daily News*. Said Mabley, "He not only is a genius in the field of electronics, but he is a terrific showman."

His genius in the usually unrelated fields of the arts and sciences are illustrated by two WBKB accomplishments—the relay with South Bend making possible Notre Dame football telecasts last year, and the presentation of first class "live" studio dramas. The Eddy personality and drive were behind both pioneering achievements.

Captain Eddy accepted his new position with Television Associates because he feels that WBKB's pioneering days are past and that his activities should be devoted to new advancements of the art. His reputation as one of the nation's outstanding television author-

ities has been built in this direction, and he holds more than 100 television, radio, and electronic patents. The first of these, the Eddy Sound Detector, which is now standard equipment in U.S. Navy submarines, was invented when, as sound officer of an undersea vessel, he began losing his hearing and needed amplifying equipment to supplement his own ears.

Finally retired from the Navy because of this disability, he entered the television laboratories of Philo Farnsworth. From this position, he moved to NBC's fast growing television division.

Paramount Pictures, entering the television field, chose him to direct its first station, WBKB. Arriving here in 1939, he soon became Chicago's "Mr. Television." Materials in 1939 were already in short supply, due to war production, and with A. H. Brolly, chief engineer of the station, assisting him, Eddy constructed the station's first transmitter, using parts from two dismantled police radio stations.

On Pearl Harbor Day, the last bomb had scarcely hit Hawaii before Eddy was on a fast train to offer his services and the facilities of WBKB to the Navy. The result was Radio Chicago, commanded by Captain Eddy, and before the war's end it had trained 86,000 radio and radar technicians. Navy officials rated it a phenomenal achievement in technical training.

"Stump the Authors" Added to WENR-TV Schedule

Stump the Authors, a program distinguished for its spontaneity and creativeness, which permits televiewers to hear the plots of complete original stories in the making, is being telecast regularly over Station WENR-TV on Mondays at 7:30 to 8:00 p.m.

Stump the Authors received notable praise from critics a few months ago when it was produced by the American Broadcasting Company on WBKB. Mail response proved the program to be highly successful television fare.

On each program a panel of three authors familiar to the program's former TV and AM audiences will assume their positions before the television cameras. Each member of the panel will be given "creative assignments" by the editor-m.c. These assignments will pertain to the type of story requested, such as comedy, romance, or tragedy. The editor also will announce the length of time which each author is allotted for relating his story. Thirty seconds will be permitted each author as a pre-narrative "thinking interval."

Ideas and themes which the authors use must be built around items suggested by the television audience. These items may be of any nature—animal, vegetable, mineral or atomic—and may range from baby shoes to coffin nails. The items used on the program will be drawn by the members of the panel from the mystery boxes.

Contributors of item suggestions which, in the opinion of the television audience, provide the best inspiration for a story will receive cash awards. The studio for Stump the Authors will be the library of the program's "editor."

The program is created and produced by Ed Skotch.

Pickup Channel 7 165 Miles Away!

When television station WENR-TV made its debut September 17 it demonstrated its facilities for telecasting any and all types of video programs. Much of the credit is being given to the improved transmitting equipment and height of the station's antenna.

According to Frank Marx, executive engineer for ABC, TV signals act similarly to light which means "WENR-TV signals are unobstructed in all directions."

"To date we have received innumerable letters from both in state and out of state viewers who have acknowledged fine reception of the test pattern which we are transmitting daily," Marx commented. "Letters have come from Milwaukee, Wis., Elgin, Ill., Holland, Mich., Cedar Lake, Ind., and as far away as Advance, Ind., which is 165 miles distant.

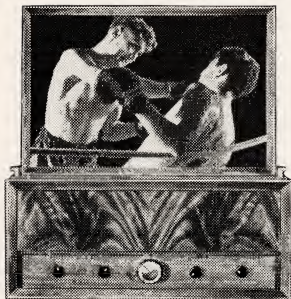
"Another advantage WENR-TV enjoys is the adoption of channel 7, one of the higher frequencies, which means that the station is less subject to interference from non-broadcast transmitters, man-made noises such as that of the ignition system on automobiles, and interference caused by industrial, scientific and medical devices.

"The television receiving antennas installed in the homes and places of business of television set owners in the Chicago area will not have to be modified to receive channel 7. There is no place in the metropolitan area of the city where WENR-TV cannot be received with a perfectly clear signal.

"Any person having difficulty with his television set should contact his local service company or the firm which installed the set. If poor reception continues, viewers should write a letter addressed to the Station WENR-TV Engineering Department, Civic Opera building, Chicago 6. The station will then advise the viewer on ways to improve reception in the set."

The pleasant mannered artist who is seen frequently on WBKB's Kukla, Fran and Ollie show has a serious side to his nature. Few know that Dick is a graduate of a theological seminary, that he will be ordained a Presbyterian minister in 1949 and that he has dedicated his life to furthering the religious ideals that are so deeply ingrained in his nature.

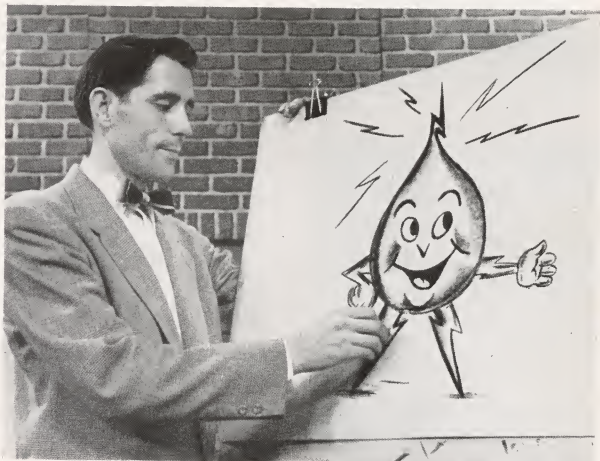
Dick has already made a good start in that direction. For two years he has appeared weekly over WAAF on a program called "Meet the Churchman." He has given illustrated lectures in more than 200 churches in Chicago in the past four years. His wife, whom

he met in college three years ago, assists him. She holds a master's degree as a religious educator. Together, they have set an enviable record in religious work.

Snyder's lucky break in television came suddenly. He wandered into WBKB's studios one day and told Reinhold Werrenrath, "I think I may have something that will go over on television." After listening to Dick's background, Werrenrath turned him over to Beulah Zachary, Executive Producer for WBKB. Three days later he made his debut on WBKB's most popular show, Kukla, Fran and Ollie.

Since then he has fascinated young and old alike with his original stories and cartoons. Nobody believes the

Townsend, Snell Join NBC Chicago Tele Staff

Two key television men from New York reported to NBC Chicago this month to aid in the preparations and operation of WNBQ, which is scheduled to begin telecasting in December. They are Charles L. Townsend, television operations supervisor, and Courtney Snell, field supervisor.

Townsend was born in Chicago on July 9, 1909. He is a graduate of Oak Park high school, Oak Park. After graduation he worked for Sears Roebuck and Co., in Chicago, briefly before joining WLS as a radio operator. In 1929 he went to Hollywood for the United Artists Corp., as a sound stage operator but returned to WLS the following year. In 1931 he joined the NBC, in Chicago, as studio engineer and remained there until 1937 when he transferred to New York as video control engineer.

WGN-TV Newsreel Cameraman Gets Brach Explosion Scoop

WGN-TV's "Chicagoland Newsreel" carried a full film account of the recent Brach Candy factory blast on Chicago's west side the same day of its occurrence, thanks to the early alertness of Newsreel cameraman Charles Gekler.

Gekler, living at 4924 Walton St., in Austin, heard the fire trucks go streaking past his house at 4:15 a.m., just 10 minutes after the explosion that rocked the neighborhood around Kinzie Ave. at 4400 west. Responding to a news man's instinct, Gekler leaped out of bed, turned on his shortwave radio and tuned in first reports on the fire at the Brach Candy factory. By 4:30 he was dressed and had a camera in the car, and at 4:50 he had set it up at the scene of the fire.

By this time flames were sweeping through the entire plant and throngs of 15,000 surged around Gekler as he took pictures of the firemen removing injured and fighting the blaze.

Speeding to St. Anne's Hospital where the injured and dead were taken, his camera also recorded pictures of the victims as they were carried in for first aid.

Rushing back to the WGN-TV newsreel department, Gekler had his remarkable film in the hands of film processors by 9 a.m., where it was developed and then given to the film cutters for editing. That evening at 8 p.m., a full picture story of the blast, one of Chicago's worst, was televised on the WGN-TV Newsreel.

During the war he worked with OSRD on an RCA project for the U.S. Navy. He aided in the design of a video camera and field transmitter which was installed in Navy planes. Townsend is married and the father of two children, a boy and a girl.

Snell was born in New York City and was graduated from White Plains high school, White Plains, N.Y. He joined NBC in 1934 as a page in Guest Relations. He worked his way through field, developing studio engineering departments in radio until he became a video control engineer in 1945. He is married and the father of two daughters.

National Dog Week Saluted on WBKB Telecasts

Television gave National Dog Week real meaning this year!

A neat promotional job was done by WBKB this past week when the Balaban and Katz station tied in wholeheartedly with National Dog Week which lasted from Sept. 19 to Sept. 25.

Each day for one solid week WBKB reminded its fans through one or more of its shows that canines are man's best friend and that this is the time of year to ask ourselves if we have been as kind to our foot-footed friends as they have been faithful to us.

The tieup began Friday, Sept. 17, when Mayor Martin H. Kennelly personally handed his proclamation of Dog Week to television's favorite dog, a collie named Mac who appears regularly on WBKB's "Woman's World."

Mac thanked Mayor Kennelly with a wag of his tail, took the scroll in his long jaws and, followed by a brace of reporters and photographers, marched dignifiedly from City Hall through the Loop to WBKB's studios at 190 North State street. There, Mac was received by Dr. W. A. Young, head of the Anti-Cruelty Society in Chicago. The "Woman's World" program was in progress but that didn't stop Mac. He carried the scroll into the studio and laid it at Dr. Young's feet. The doctor picked it up and read the proclamation, along with Governor Dwight Green's proclamation to television viewers.

For the next seven days WBKB reminded Chicagoans of National Dog Week as they have seldom been reminded before. Two films on dog care and training were shown; a homeless puppy was given away to a winner of the Midget Boxing show; the nightly newsreel, Telecharades, Victor and Young and Woman's World all emphasized the significance of Dog Week in their programs. Russ Davis went a step further and presented a dog act on his Sunday Knickerbocker Amateur Hour.

"Television should contribute something to the community," said Mr. John Balaban, Executive Manager of WBKB. "We have tried through television to

Through the magic of television WBKB has truly helped us accomplish our aim. More humane treatment, better care and understanding of dogs will certainly result in the years to come."

Notre Dame, Purdue, Illini Games on WBKB Schedule

Complete coverage of eight major football games from three mid-western universities has been announced by television station WBKB. The Balaban and Katz station will focus its cameras on home games at Notre Dame, Illinois and Purdue. The first game scheduled was September 25 between Purdue and Notre Dame.

Thereafter WBKB will cover the games between Michigan State at Notre Dame, Oct. 9; Purdue at Illinois, Oct. 23; Marquette at Purdue, Oct. 30; Iowa at Illinois, Nov. 6; Northwestern at Notre Dame, Nov. 13; Indiana at Purdue, Nov. 20; Washington at Notre Dame, Nov. 27.

The games will be brought to Chicago video fans through new facilities which have been in preparation for several months.

"The Illinois and Purdue games are a logical development in our plans to bring our audience the very best in sports entertainment," said WBKB executives in announcing the schedule.

Joe Wilson, ace sports announcer, will again describe the games for WBKB fans and the coverage will be under the direction of Reinald Werrenrath, Director of Special Events for the station. Cameras will be supervised by Harry Birch, outstanding lensman, who will himself handle one of the cameras.

The Knickerbocker Hour, popular amateur program seen on Sunday nights over WBKB, has been renewed for another thirteen weeks by the O'Neil, Larson, McMahon agency. The time, 7:00 to 8:00 p.m., remains the same and the show will continue to originate in the Knickerbocker Hotel.

genial artist when he admits that he never had a formal drawing lesson in his life. "Drawing to me is instinctive. I began as soon as I was able to hold a sketch pencil in my hand."

This fall, Dick will continue the same type of work with Kukla, Fran and Ollie. He intermingles public domain fairy tales with original stories of his own and drawing lessons.

Snyder's favorite cartoonist? Probably Milt Caniff with Al Capp a close second.

But the man who stands highest in Dick's esteem is Chicago's own Vaughn Shoemaker, "the top editorial cartoonist in the country." Shoemaker has followed the path that Snyder would like to follow. Two-time winner of the Pulitzer prize, Vaughn Shoemaker is a lay preacher for the Pentecostal church and, as Dick puts it, "has shown grateful appreciation for his God-given talent by putting it to an idealistic and religious use."

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
