## Stage Errors

## Advice for TV Beginners

Hardly a day passes that we don't meet some one girl or boy interested in becoming a television star. We are grateful for the confidence these young people have placed in our counsel, but hasten to advise them—and anyone else with an eye on the TV screen—that video stars are not made overnight.

It takes hard work, plenty of time.

Some stage errors, however, are so glaring that Chicago stations have drawn up basic rules to govern the performance of their stars, regardless of their former radio experience.

These are rules the amateur would do well to read over carefully before appearing on any show. Mr. Average Reader will also find the rules interesting; they will give him a better idea of the complexities of staging television productions, not one or two, but hundreds each week.

—Remember, the television audience sees only what the camera sees.

—Speak up. In most productions, except remote telecasts at sports events, microphones are kept out of the picture.

—Avoid that "I'm-waiting-for-a-cue-to-go-on" expression at the beginning of scenes. Acknowledging cues or signals renders an amateurish touch.

—Work close, abnormally close, to fellow players. This practice helps cameramen to wheel in for close-ups and prevents cutting one of the players out of the picture frame.

—If given a definite spot in which to stand, adhere to the wishes of the director. Camera movements and special techniques are planned ahead to conform with actor's placements.

—Move slowly, rise and sit slowly. This will give the cameraman a better opportunity to follow you.

—Be available on the set. Nothing is more frustrating for a director than to discover a player has wandered off for a coke or smoke. Floor managers cannot leave their phones and conduct a hunt. Take your entrance on cue from the manager or on a line.

—Watch the manager. He is there not only to help the show, but to help

you. Even though the camera may be off you during the course of the show, keep a careful eye on him for unexpected instructions. Signals are often given by hand, previously prepared cards, or on a chalk marked slate. It certainly helps to learn both radio and television signals, and to consult with each floor manager before the program.

—Tip on timing. In order to maintain a schedule, shows must not run under-time or overtime. The floor manager will indicate a stretch or a hurry signal.

—Watch the red lights. On the top of each camera a red light will burn while the camera is on. Remember—that is the picture your audience will see.

—At the end of a scene, your mood and position must be sustained. Do not drop expression or walk off until the all-clear is given and the next scene flows smoothly.

There are others, but these will give you an idea of how to aid the director, giving him more time to concentrate on dramatic angles, not to mention the confidence you will have in knowing elementary rules.

# Bennett Entertains on Radio, TV Shows

If he cups his left hand over his ear when he's singing, then it's Lee Bennett. At least that was the trademark of Mr. Radio Bennett, whose theory was he could better tell how he sounded on the air if he used that system.

Now, Mr. Television Bennett has to curb those automatic reflexes, for video has a way of changing radio personalities. Lee is now seen Sunday evenings on WGN-TV in "Stars of Tomorrow," amateur talent program telecast from 9 to 9:30.

Fans of Bennett the singer, Bennett the announcer, Bennett the bandleader have asked *Television Forecast* to interview the channel 9 star. This is what our reporters discovered:

## Native of Nebraska

Lee is a native of Lincoln, Neb. Born on Independence Day, 1911, he was raised in the great plains, later was graduated in 1931 from the University of Nebraska where he was active in college dramatics. His first radio job with KFAB in Lincoln was as an announcer and writer.

## Formed Orchestra

In 1935 Lee came to Chicago, first appeared on WGN as a singer, later became a vocalist with Jan Garber's orchestra. For seven years he trouped with Garber, making stage and radio appearance and acting in movie short subjects.

In 1936, Lee and Julie Randall, who also sang with Garber, were married. The two entertained thousands when Lee had his own orchestra during 1936-37.

Six years ago, Lee joined the staff of WGN as an announcer, later became soloist on the "Say It With Music" series. Followers of the "Chicago Theater of the Air" each Saturday hear Lee Bennett in a more formal type of program.

## WGN-TV to Carry CBS Programs

Until micro-wave relay or coaxial cable connect Chicago with the rest of the CBS television network, WGN-TV will carry all available Columbia Broadcasting System programs by recording.

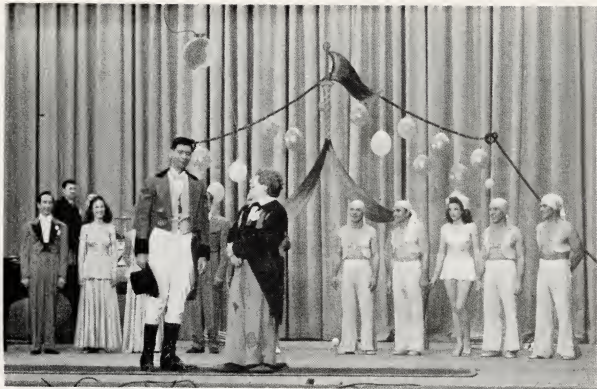
WGN-TV recently surprised the midwest with its announcement of the CBS affiliation. Other CBS stations are in New York, Boston, Schenectady, New Haven, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington, D.C., Atlanta, Detroit, Toledo, Milwaukee, Houston, Los Angeles, Cleveland and Seattle.

With the current freeze order on by the Federal Communications Commission, no new TV stations are being granted licenses to operate. CBS, last of the big networks to begin activities in Chicago, has temporarily beat the freeze.

It a thaw sets in this spring, and the FCC oks construction of the new stations, CBS may be assigned a separate channel. Until such time, it is anyone's guess what will happen next, what with Chicago TV being like Chicago weather.

## TV Sets in Seattle Increase

Seattle, Washington, according to our west coast correspondent, now has 1,000 TV set owners serviced by KRSC-TV, with expectations of 4,000.

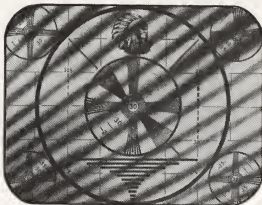

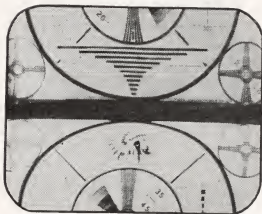

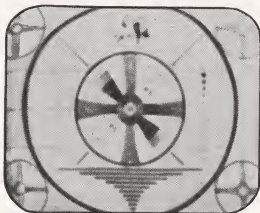

# Coburn Describes Installation Types

By WILSON COBURN

Most Television Receivers are sold to the customer with a one-year service warranty and a normal installation (whether Home or Commercial). For the present I will assume all installations are normal and will explain an abnormal installation and what must be done to rectify this situation.

A normal installation consists of an all-wave antenna, 100 feet of transmission lead-in line, stand off insulators, guy wire, brackets, about 2½ crew man hours of time, and whatever else necessary to make a neat looking installation. A television receiver is no better than the antenna used and the manner in which this antenna is installed. The best reception on television in Chicago and its suburban area is obtained by the use of a broad band all-wave antenna. This antenna must be designed to give maximum signal gain over the complete TV spectrum—44 to 216 megacycles. The antenna on the low channel station (44 to 88 mc) for best results should have a receiving element cut to about 88" and a reflector element cut to about 96". The antenna on the high channel station (176 to 216 mc) should have a receiving element cut to about 14" and a reflector element cut to about 16" for best reception.

## Require All-Wave Antenna

Most television manufacturers prescribe and insist that the servicing companies installing for them use an antenna which meets these specifications. The normal installation zone is within a 25-mile radius of State and Madison Street in Chicago.

\*Outside this normal installation zone area and even in some instances within this area a good picture cannot be obtained with the material specified for a normal installation. In these cases special equipment, such as extension masts, special antennas, additional transmission line, boosters, additional labor, and many other innovations, are used to try and get best reception.

stallation is where a viewer lives in an area where he is receiving a high channel station well and has poor reception on a low channel station or vice versa. To rectify this it might be necessary to stack two high or two low channel antennas together or add height with a mast, and sometimes two separate transmission lines with a switch, and sometimes two complete antennas stacked will help in improving the reception. All this additional work is not considered when a normal installation is quoted and the service companies cannot be expected to stand by the television owner.

## Describe Residential Type

A "residential" type customer is one who has a set installed in his private home for his individual family use alone. A "non-residential" customer is one who uses the receiver for public entertainment, educational or commercial purposes in offices, hotels, taverns, clubs, theaters, restaurants, hospitals, schools, police stations, fire stations, churches, barbershops, doctor's offices, etc. These latter are termed commercial installations and are at rates above the normal home installation. These are what is known as a normal commercial installation.

Many times it is impossible to get permission to install a television antenna on the house and an inside antenna is sometimes used. Caution must be given such an installation as it does not equal reception obtained on an outside antenna and many times just won't work out. In all cases where the customer is in questionable location a survey may be made, at customer's expense, to determine if set will work. In other cases where set put in won't work a normal nominal charge is made at customer's expense, when the installation is removed.
