NEW YORK—One major radio casualty coming up this fall will move NBC's "Your Hit Parade," AM version, back from Saturday night to Thursday p.m. Luckies, which sponsors the song & dance routine, apparently doesn't want to sell all of its smokes on weekends. . . . Lou Costello and Bud Abbott are scheduled for a quartet of full hour shows in the coming season, but Abbott & Costello fans can expect much more than that. In the works are 22 additional film programs. . . . The FCC's recent boost in power to 41 stations is expected to needle TV set manufacturers into a record fall volume. . . . Humorist Sam Levenson may move into the panel of "This Is Show Business" on a permanent basis, now that Abe Burrows is departing. . . . Now they're talking about a "Claudia" series, based on the Rose Franken novel.

Pert Roberta Quinlan tees off her song specialties on "Mohawk Showroom" starting Sept. 3. . . . Keep your TV eyes open Sept. 8. That Saturday, you'll see the big fall revivals of "Ken Murray Show," "All Star Revue" (formerly titled "Four Star Revue"), "Your Show of Shows," and "One Man's Family." That means the headliners in action that evening will include Sid Caesar, Imogene Coca and Ken Murray, in addition to a raft of other topnotchers. . . . ABC has raided the NBC network successfully by snagging the popular kid show "Hollywood Junior Circus." . . . Dagmar, the buxom blonde, may be eased out of NBC now that "Broadway Open House" is having trouble locating a sponsor. However, towering Dagmar is ready with her own weekly program on ABC. . . . DuMont will telecast the "Bigelow Theatre" series this fall, because CBS couldn't clear enough stations to carry the show.

There's a remarkable response to actor Franchot Tone's recent TV appearance on CBS' "Starlight Theatre." It may signalize a comeback for the veteran film idol. . . . Ed Sullivan will salute songwriters Oscar Hammerstein and Irving Berlin this month, Oscar during "Toast of the Town" on Sept. 9 and 16, and Irving during a special one-hour program on Sept. 12. Celebrities who'll help Smilin' Ed on those dates are Dinah Shore, Tony Martin and Margaret Truman. . . . Variety magazine reports that Herb Shriver, the homespun Hoosier story-teller, may take over the CBS time formerly held by "The Goldbergs." . . . Studs Terkel, ABC philosopher, thinks that a girl will love a man for all she's worth for all he's worth. . . . Songstar Peggy Lee will sub for dancer Patricia Bowman on the latter's CBS show on Sept. 1, while Miss Bowman is fulfilling an engagement in St. Louis.

The network TV future of comic Cliff Norton, one of last season's freshest laugh-getters, is shaky as a result of the recent stalemate over Dave Garroway's return to the networks. . . . Zenith is quietly experimenting with color telecasts over its local Chicago channel. . . . Comic Garry Moore says that a good-looking girl seldom passes a good looking glass. . . . CBS is prepared to spend \$25,000 each week on the "See It Now" newscasts being planned for early fall. . . . Keep those hankies out, girls. Forthcoming is a TV version of radio's veteran soap opera, "Aunt Jenny."

THE ARTHUR MURRAY SHOW

IT WAS through the determination of a diffident youth named Arthur Murray that the now famous dancing schools bearing his name are such a widespread and popular part of American life. The "wallflower" of twenty years ago hardly had the opportunity to shake off his inhibitions and take part in America's number one pastime as does the One Step Charlie of today.

Arthur Murray saw to that—and only because he himself was at such a complete loss on the dance floor.

Mr. Murray is the dancing counterpart of Charles Atlas. As a young man he was neither a good dancer, nor a good mixer. He decided he could cope with the latter if he could learn to dance well.

Now years later Arthur Murray's name is synonymous with dancing. His well known schools are located all over the country. With the advent of television, the Murray technique is coming into the homes of millions in the U. S. It's school time again—with a glossier sheen perhaps. Pretty girls, handsome instructors and a professional touch. But the goal's the same: better dancing for a dancing America.

There are no wallflowers in "The Arthur Murray line-up." Under the guidance of the vivacious Mrs. Arthur Murray, wife of the famed dance instructor, the show keeps up a lively, tuneful pace with the guest stars and stage hands alike liable to join in the Murray-go-round of dancing.

Mrs. Murray is a petite (5'2") hostess, who while she isn't performing herself, is leading dance instructors and their students through their paces.

She loves being kidded and encourages such comment from her guest stars

as well as her TV audiences. A college professor once penned a note to her stating, "You are a charming hostess and dancer," adding trenchantly, "but you clap your hands like a seal hitting her flippers." Mrs. Murray considers this her fondest bit of constructive criticism.

You'd never guess it to look at her, but the "better half" of the dancing Murrays is a grandmother. Here is real inspiration for the "life begins at forty" set. A typical fan letter from one such TV viewer read: "Like yourself I am a grandmother. If your secret for keeping so young is dancing, I'd like to make an appointment for my introductory lesson."

It's the Murray theory that everyone should put his best foot forward—and dance. Whether it's the Patti Cake Polka or Bambuco, Samba or Square Dance, the Murray show whirls through its rhythmic paces to which even the TV engineers cannot resist a little foot tapping.

On their television show, the Murrays prevail upon the faint hearts of those suffering from variations of Ball Room Phobia. Their prescription is simple: join in the party. For once the show begins, the most left-footed TV viewers are apt to pick up the tuneful beat of the Murray dance brigade.

The magic of the Murrays on the dance floor is not done by mirrors. They're a hard working team who will never be content until every man, woman and child are on their feet—and dancing.

The "Arthur Murray" program is now off for the summer, but is expected to make an early appearance on the autumn TV schedule.



UPPER LEFT—In a Samba Full Turn, the man steps forward on his left foot, leaning to the left. After short pushes with right foot, the weight returns to the left, on a one-two count. He steps back on right foot (shown above), giving short pushes with left foot to a three-four count.

UPPER RIGHT—In a Samba Half Turn, the man puts his weight forward on the left foot, with his body leaning slightly to the left. He uses the left foot as a pivot.

LOWER LEFT—In a basic Samba step, the arms are held in a Maxixe stance, with the elbows bent. One hand is cupped before the face, the elbow resting lightly on the other hand. The position of the arms may be shifted at each step.

LOWER RIGHT—In the Invitation to Dance, palms are held up, and the partners step forward, fluttering the hands to a one-two count. Holding the palms up, the arms are lowered as partners step back, fluttering the hands to a finishing count of three and four.

SCHOOL GOES TO TV



**IOWA STATE COLLEGE
REVERSES THE
PROCEDURE**

IN THE HEART of the Iowa Corn Belt, a few miles north of the state's capital city of Des Moines, stands a group of red brick buildings representing Iowa State College, the site of the U.S.'s first exclusively educational TV station.

Even with its thirty year background in radio, Iowa State's progressive step was a large undertaking—particularly from the financial standpoint. But with ambition and the necessary ingenuity plus a singleness of purpose, the Ames, Iowa institution has led the fight for proper educational TV coverage.

WOI-TV at Ames, upon which rests these days the envious eyes of educators from other colleges seeking TV permits,

is the home of the nation's first college-owned, noncommercial TV station. As such, it is the birthplace of a revolution in the communication of information and ideas.

Although education by television received lip service from all segments of the industry, it got little else until WOI-TV went on the air with test patterns early in 1950. Iowa State College, whose radio station WOI is one of 120 college-owned stations in the country, started surveying television's economic road in 1945 and was granted the first TV construction permit by the Federal Communications Commission. Then followed a freeze on permits—and WOI-TV found itself the only television station in the Des Moines area.

The net result is somewhat of a paradox. Where educators were normally forced to go to the networks to get education on the air, the networks are now approaching WOI-TV with the hope of airing commercial time in the Des Moines area.

Described as a non-profit, educational operation, the station has temporary NBC, ABC, CBS and DuMont network affiliations. They will continue until the FCC licenses a commercial station for the area.

All funds for the construction and operation of WOI-TV came from the college, a land grant institution supported by the state. Richard Hull, its director, confides that the cost of putting the station on the air was only a fraction of the normal cost of building and equipping a TV station. (Commercial stations run between \$750,000 and \$1,000,000.)

The function of an educational TV station varies, of course, with the interests of the community which it serves. The central Iowa region, being primarily agricultural, is beamed many programs along agrarian lines.

Remote control telecasts have become a familiar sight along Iowa's countryside. WOI-TV's big mobile unit, a specially equipped LM-152 International Harvester truck, is often present for coverage of local fairs, homemaking and agricultural field demonstrations and the like.

One of the highly successful on-the-spot shows the youthful video station has covered was the recent Iowa State

College's annual spring festival. Sixty miles away, farmers left newly-plowed fields and huddled about their television sets to view the same event. It was Iowa at work and play through the magic medium of television.

Employing some of television's great potential, education through TV has begun to make headway by the pioneering initiative of such institutions as Iowa State College.





TV Interference Can be Trapped: Remedy

Many amateurs have been increasingly successful in solving the problem of TV interference from power lines, household appliances, auto ignition, X-ray and diathermy machines, using ingenious home-built interference traps that can be attached to the TV receiver.

Latest of these devices, described in the August issue of *Science and Mechanics* magazine, is designed to cure specific interference from auto ignitions and consists of two simple capacitors and a homemade coil mounted on a fiber plate. The trap can be assembled in a few hours and is installed on the antenna lead-in line with one connection going to the set's ground wire.



The Less Said About Quiz Shows The Better

The summer programs, bless them, are fading fast away, and it's time for a Summertime Review—not on TV, but of TV.

There's been some disappointment expressed in the public prints and in television homes over the quality, or lack of it, in the past summer's TV fare. Compared with the preceding summer, the offerings were rather dismal.

We were swamped with quiz and panel shows, and most of them were miserable. The less said about them the better, with the exception of Down You Go, which made its debut on the air this summer, but as a new show in its own right and not a summer replacement. To the credit of commercial TV, it snagged a sponsor and is with us regularly now.

The only imaginative, promising new bit of television came, to no one's surprise, from Chicago. This was Short Story Playhouse, which introduced the technique of having a narrator as part of the drama. With excellent production, intelligent acting, and a smart choice of stories, the show caught the fancy of the public, and it is hoped that it too will remain on the air permanently.

The biggest disappointment of the summer? It's a large field. Doodles Weaver, Phil Baker, the White Sox, American Inventory, Oscar Levant, Go Lucky, and Saturday night are some of the nominees.

Whereas in the summer a year ago you sensed that television was seeking to improve its programs by experiment-



ing and trying new techniques, the feeling this summer was that the New York moguls reasoned, "It's vacation time so toss in some quiz show for the yokels and let's all go to Paris."

It's unfair to some of the old faithful year-around programs to condemn the whole summer TV fare because of the shortcomings of the summer replacements. Godfrey stayed on the air with both his shows much of the summer, and for a good many viewers, Talent Scouts took a decided upturn when Godfrey went to Europe and Herb Shriner took over. The same was true last summer when Robert Q. Lewis was Godfrey's sub.

Westinghouse, Philco, Kraft, and several other dramatic shows remained on the air, up to their usual high standards. Super Circus stayed with us to keep the kids quiet for an hour Sundays. Ed Sullivan's Toast of the Town and the Cavalcades of Bands and Stars kept vaudeville alive until Berle gets back.

For a lazy summer day there's little more satisfying than hitting the couch and watching a good baseball game. The Sox were a lot more satisfying in the cooler weather, but we shouldn't expect too much the first year.

Of course the truth is that the quality of the winter season shows has spoiled us. A couple of years ago a lineup of programs such as we have had this summer would have seemed downright sensational. Don't you wonder what the shows will be like in the dog days of 1956?

favorite recipe

no. 10 of a series

Louise Murphy, wife of the amiable co-emcee of "Bob and Kay" and emcee of "Sach's Amateur Hour" both on WENR-TV, contributes a recipe passed down to her by her German ancestors. As Louise points out, "There is no set formula for potato salad. It's mostly according to individual taste. My mother verbally explained how to prepare it, and I think this is the first time I've ever tried to write it down."

The mother of six children, Louise prepares the salad for eight people—and the following ingredients are in proportion for eight servings.

GERMAN POTATO SALAD

(Louise Murphy)

Boil potatoes (the average is two per person, but the number depends on appetite). Let potatoes cool.

For sauce, the following are needed:

bacon
onions
cider vinegar
sugar

Take three-fourths to a pound of bacon. Slice bacon horizontally and vertically into about $\frac{1}{4}$ inch squares. Place bacon in skillet large enough to hold sauce and fry pieces until crisp and brown. Don't drain off bacon-fat. Turn over very low flame. Add one large or two

medium sized onions, chopped fine. Let onions simmer about 15 minutes. Add vinegar in ratio of one cup of vinegar to $\frac{1}{4}$ cup of water. For eight servings there should be two cups of vinegar and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup water. Add 1 heaping teaspoon of sugar (this in proportion to taste). Let sauce simmer for an hour over a very low flame, leaving pan uncovered.

Slice potatoes into heat-resistant bowl and warm. Pour hot sauce over potatoes and serve while still warm.

Louise suggests serving baked ham, pineapple and cabbage salad and salt sticks with the potato salad.



TOM S. GALLERY, energetic rejuvenator of the DuMont Television Network's sports department, assures TV sports fans the opportunity to see plenty of sports this fall. (WGN-TV is the Chicago outlet.) The Dumont sports chief has reportedly signed contracts covering twenty-seven major sports events with six sponsors on the line to underwrite them.

The Chicago Bears-Cleveland Browns football game is slated for the Dumont TV network Sept. 9 with little prospect of Chicagoans seeing it on their TV screens. WGN-TV has firm contracts with American Vitamin Associates to telecast White Sox-Detroit Tigers at Comiskey Park on that date. . . . The Miller Brewing Co., sponsors of the football clas-

sic, are anxious to hit the Chicago market. Talking long distance to Mr. Paul Mueller, general sales manager, he commented: "It is regrettable that WGN-TV cannot pick up the telecast. If at all possible, we may request another station to carry the game in Chicago." . . . The only station in position to pick up the Bear-Brown tilt is WBKB. Sportscaster Joe Wilson of WBKB admits their CBS station can carry the game but the entire picture at the present time is too muddled to say anything definite.

Fear of TV hurting the gate forbade any announcements of the College All-Stars-Cleveland Browns game being on television. The *Sun-Times*, sponsors of the Bear-Brown classic, may be adhering to the same tight lipped policy.



The spectacle is Linn Burton's Curtiss "Knot-Hole Gang," seen over WBKB, 1:00 p.m. before all Cub games.

Sandlotters from organized teams and leagues are invited to Wrigley Field for Linn's popular TV show.
