NEW YORK—Old guard Republicans were reported very happy about Senator Taft's celebrated TV hassle with Tex McCrary (an Eisenhower booster) on "Author Meets the Critics" show last month. The Senator, long noted for his colorless personality, had the viewers and the studio audience rooting for him. One critic opined: "They can't call him (Taft) dull anymore." . . . Roscoe Karns, who portrays inspector Rocky King on DuMont's whodunit series, holds the unofficial record for a TV star appearing in Hollywood films. The likeable character actor appeared in no less than 200 movies before his TV splash. . . . The report that Harpo Marx has signed an exclusive radio-TV contract with NBC leaves many in the dark as to what the speechless comic will do on radio. Play the harp, perhaps?

Here-We-Go-Again Dep't: A spokesman for the American Bar Association singled out "The Lone Ranger" and "Hopalong Cassidy" as shows that "glorify a self-appointed guardian of justice who takes the law into his own hands." . . . Milton Berle, who left for a two week vacation recently and returned to find his rating considerably deflated, is going on another hiatus April 1. Actor Dick Powell will do the subbing for Uncle Miltie this time. Nielsen, look out below! . . . She looks a few years older, but singer Marion Marlowe is actually 22 years of age. And in answer to the many inquiries, she is married.

Jerry Lester, one of the group of comics drawing a fat salary as a compensation for not working, will soon get employment. He is ticketed to emcee a TV version of "Blind Date," the radio holdover formerly handled by Arlene Francis. . . . Columbia Records insists that the TV appearances of their current top singer, Johnnie Ray, has not hurt record sales. There were reports that Ray fans, upon seeing their idol perform, have been disillusioned. Tain't so. Sales are still booming.

This report slipped by the Southern California Chamber of Commerce: The recent heavy rains which deluged Hollywood penetrated the "My Friend Irma" set. Buckets were placed on the stage, in the aisles and on some seats at show time. It seems the two million dollar studio roof was leaking. . . . George Gallup, the pollster who somehow weathered the 1948 presidential upset (after predicting the election of Dewey) will showcase some of his grass roots reports—this time on TV. A program starring Gallup is being peddled for a pre-election showing.

Peter Donald, who did a fine job subbing for Bert Parks on the latter's day-time show, tells this tale: It's about the chap who went to Yale and came home for his vacation sporting a long mane of uncut hair. His buddies noticed it, but made no comment. You see, explains Pete, they had all heard of Yale locks! . . . Vivian Blaine, the gal who's wowing 'em in New York in the legit show "Guys & Dolls," is receiving left-handed compliments from the TV critics. The boys who write the reviews claim her talent is going to pot on the TV flimsy "Those Two," adding that the less said about her partner Pinky Lee, the better.

STAR OF "HOW DOES YOUR GARDEN GROW"

MANY an office athlete has been subjected to a painful and quiet defeat by a spading fork. Spring is on the way, and so is an epidemic of backache among the folks who have been confining their raking to sorting out the mail on an office desk.

The point of these observations is that it doesn't pay to wait until the first warm spring day to get all your primary garden chores out of the way. By setting up the project right now, you can get most of it out of the way by easy stages.

Tools: Hand tools may have accumulated rust over winter and should be cleaned up with sandpaper and sharpened. Tool handles may need paint, and it's a good time to send the lawn mower out for reconditioning.

Spraying: There is still time to apply dormant spray to the fruit trees. Make sure the spray pump and tank are in good working order; inspect tank for rust spots (if it is steel), apply oil to the compression gasket in the pump.

Grass: Theoretically, you can sow lawn seed anytime from now until late spring, but the earlier the better, before hot dry weather sets in. A light sowing is useful for established lawns. Apply fertilizer two weeks before the seed.

Leaves: *Rake the leaves out of flower beds and hedges, but don't throw the leaves away. Put them on the compost heap.*

Painting: If you have any fences or trellises to be painted, do it the first mild day and don't wait until the foliage has formed on shrubs and plants.

Pruning: There's still time to shape up fruit trees, berry bushes and hedges before the sap really starts to run. Touch up any large cuts with whatever covering material is handy—paint, tar, etc.

Coldframes: A good way to get a headstart on the season is to establish seed flats in a coldframe or hot bed, although you probably should have prepared for this last fall.

Early flowers: Flowering shrubs such as forsythia, and fruit tree prunings can provide early blossoms for the house. Bring the branches into a warm room and put the butts in warm water (not hot).

Edging: Flower beds and borders can be trimmed up with an edging tool anytime the ground is soft enough to work.

PECK'S



WHEN famed strip-teaser Gypsy Rose Lee appeared on "What's My Line?" blindfolded panelist Hal Block flexed his dimples and innocently asked "Are you famous for being well-dressed?" The audience went into hysterics. But many viewers' eyebrows were raised. Was the show becoming rigged?

"What's My Line?" is unquestionably the most popular quiz show on television. By milking audience laughs at the expense of the seemingly in-the-dark panel it has kept its ratings high. But its polished formula was running into a snag. And the major cause of the trouble was ample-dimpled Hal Block.

As a former gagman for such bosom-conscious comics as Ken Murray and Olsen & Johnson, Hal knows well the value of a double-edged joke. Looking as if butter wouldn't melt in his mouth, Hal launches questions at the show's guests that are dripping with suggestion.

While this practice has endeared Hal to the fans, it has also alarmed the sponsors. Moderator John Daly was called upon to blunt Hal's double-edged sword. Each time Hal bordered on the blue-line, John would pull his ear signifying that Hal should pass to the next panelist. This process backfired when the other panelists decided to get into the act. Daly began to look like a man with a defective ear.

As chief offender Hal Block became a liability. The sponsors tried to ease him out. When viewers found Hal's chair occupied by a new panelist, a storm of mail flooded CBS threatening

to boycott the show if Hal wasn't returned. But citizen groups threatened to boycott the show if off-color suggestions weren't dropped. After a few weeks' penance Hal came back on the show with the caution "Keep it clean."

The curly-headed center of this storm is an amiable well-groomed bachelor of 37 whose flair for humor was first cultivated as editor of Phoenix, the campus humor magazine at the University of Chicago. Hal is a Chicago boy and his father Max Block is a prominent Chicago lawyer.

Hal majored in law at the U. of C. but he also found time to dabble in dramatics and Captain the track team. But his first love was writing.

Upon graduation in 1935, Hal talked the then popular comic Phil Baker into hiring him as a gag writer. For three years Hal sweated out the famous Baker, Beetle and Bottle routines. When Baker's popularity waned, Hal departed for greener pastures. He has since written gags for most of the top comedians in the business.

While writing the Saturday night Ken Murray show, Hal was tapped for the job as panelist on "What's My Line?" Then his former employers found that they had a competitor.

Typical of the Block-busters that have kept the sponsors in a frenzy is Hal's query of a lobster salesman. "Would I take it to bed with me on a cold night?" What products he would take to bed he didn't say but this double-meaning question was unusually singular.

Giving weight to the charge that the show is rigged are some of the other panelist's questionable questions. When

a Pullman berth manufacturer appeared on the show, panelist Garry Moore asked "Could an unmarried man and an unmarried woman be entertained in it?" While John Daly tugged frantically at his ear, sets all over the country were snapped off.

Despite all the furor over Hal Block, he is easily one of the best reasons why the show is popular. His nimble wit, his pixie charm and his twinkling smile add up to one of television's most winning personalities.

When Hal was served with the sponsor's ultimatum it cut down on his effectiveness. All his questions are now minutely examined for off-color implications. And as television's "Peck's Bad Boy," he's often misunderstood.

If Mal Bellairs' home life were to be described in a poker player's lingo, it might well be termed a "full house."

For Mal, star of his own DuMont musical show and quizmaster on ABC's "What's The Answer," is head of the family in a household bulging with youth. Father of four children and possessor of an amazingly calm disposition, Mal attributes his placidity to coping with everyday problems of his thriving brood. After all, he can't very well be browbeaten by such inanimate objects as television cameras and mike booms after playing the role of helpful father to four very small, very active youngsters.

The Bellairs' philosophy—which keeps the family happy and ulcer-free—is centered on the theme; "Never say no if you can help it."

Both Mal and his wife, Jo, devote a good portion of their time to the Bellairs sprouts. Jo is den mother of Keith's Cub Scout den and Mal is a pack committeeman. Jo might be asked to act as chairman for a St. Patrick's Day party while Mal is making wigs for a school play.

Or you might find both Bellairs at home, working on a nursery for their two girls, decorating an "un-birthday" cake (Jo bakes the masterpiece with Mal contributing the art work) with the aid of two-year-old Patti, helping to further the scientific and atomic energy interests of eight-year-old Keith, tending to the needs of five-year-old Jerry's wild life (goldfish, turtles, frogs and snails and possibly a snake in the near future) or just tending to the baby, Kimberly Ann.

There's always time for a game in the active Bellairs household whether it's ice skating, tennis or basketball. And all the offspring are learning to pitch in with the housework. Keith scrambles eggs. Jerry makes cookies and Patti is teaching little Kim to lick the fudge pan.

All this activity might lead a casual observer to believe that life in the Bellairs household is a rather hectic scramble. And it is. But it's one of choice rather than necessity.

Life for the broad-shouldered, well-built Mal has meant a pursuit of humor and a concentration on the "brighter side." Jo even recalls that Mal's proposal was a masterpiece of logic, divorced from romance and almost comical in its appeal: "Let's get married, Jo, so we can have a family."



PET PEEVE—

When Good Shows Conflict

By JACK MABLEY



How many times has 8:30 on Monday night rolled around, and you are confronted with the teaser—will I watch Robert Montgomery, or wait for Studio One?

Both are hour-long dramatic shows, and both are good ones. Studio One has been on the air for several years, always at 9 p.m. Mondays. Last year NBC irritated me, and a few million others, by scheduling the new Montgomery program half-an-hour before Studio One, so that it was impossible to watch both shows.

In our house we have tried watching half of Montgomery and all of Studio One, all of Montgomery and half of Studio One, and even once tried three-quarters of each. None work very well.

Conflict of good TV shows is bad now, and won't get any better. Every viewer has his pet peeves. Here are some of mine—programs that I'd like to see but which are on at the same hour, on different stations.

Groucho Marx and Burns and Allen; Studs' Place and Wayne King; Dragnet and Herb Shriner; Philco and Waring; Sullivan and Comedy Hour; TV Showcase and Paul Whiteman; What's My Line and Cameo Theatre; Celanese Theater and Boxing; and Rebound and Down You Go.

Of course there's a bright side too. So far I haven't heard any complaints about Utley and The Continental conflicting. (Latest A.R.B. rating I saw on Continental was 0.3.)

The "Chicago TV is dead" school of thought gets another rebuttal in the form of United Television Programs, Inc., a Chicago organization which in the past year—its first—chalked up a million and a half dollars in billings.

The company is a film distributor, and is responsible for, among other things, the excellent series seen on WENR-TV Fridays, Rebound. Packard Motors bought the series from the Chicago company, which in turn placed the films on stations in 19 cities.

This system of TV sponsorship is bound to become increasingly popular with advertisers. Packard is a good example. Last year they sponsored a variety program with Don Ameche which never did click, and which was seen on a limited network, against tough competition in some cases. Some cities which Packard wanted to reach couldn't even carry the program because of having only one station.

Under the system of buying film programs, the sponsor can use different days in each city, and can select his own group of cities. It is much more flexible than buying network time. Its advantage to the advertiser probably will offset the absence of timeliness which detracts from all filmed TV shows. The net result is that we may expect to see more shows on film.

If the shows keep up to the quality of Rebound and I Love Lucy, we'll have no complaint.





DEAR BOSS:

I'd like to take a deep breath and say something nice about three capitalistic enterprises that do me a favor every week. One of these outfits sells tires, the other shingles and the other time on television. Their names: Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, Johns-Manville and Dumont Television Network

The favor they do me is to bring three fine television programs into my home. Goodyear sponsors The Greatest Story Ever Told—dramatized stories from the life of Jesus. These living parables don't preach, but rather show the effect of Jesus' teachings on the lives of the people of His times. Always they hold up the mirror and usually they make me squirm at what I see there.

Johns-Manville's gift is Fairmeadows, USA. The people Agnes Ridgeway creates in her story of small town America are not melodramatic neurotics teetering on the edge of panic, frustrations, infidelities and corruption. Her people aren't perfect, either. But they seem to live the kinds of lives most of us would like to consider normal. A young minister helps to point up the Christian attitude of neighbor toward neighbor even when it hurts. A spinster seamstress quietly practices the kind of everyday faith most church goers hear Sunday morning and conveniently mislay first thing Sunday afternoon.

Then Dumont brings me Bishop Sheen. He is a teacher and a great one. He talks about God and man; what God wants men to do and their rewards for following God's way. He speaks eloquently, but with a certain casual assurance. Like a man who knows. Like a man who has questioned and been answered. Like a man who is positive in the midst of doubts, indifference and cynicism.

Some people would call all three programs corny. If they are—perhaps it's time for the corny to inherit the earth.

JOE WILSON, erstwhile WBKB sports director, will move his wares to Mutual Broadcasting System's "Game of the Day" baseball broadcasts this season. Although the colorful sportscaster will cover games originating in Chicago, Detroit, Cincinnati and St. Louis, he will continue to make his home in Wilmette. *Joe's too talented and experienced for his absence before TV cameras to become too prolonged.*

WGN-TV will begin its baseball telecasts with the City Series, April 11th, and will continue through the season with 77 Cub home games and 57 Sox daylight encounters. The reason for a 20 game deficit on the White Sox schedule is General Manager Frank Lane's policy of not televising night games.

It was interesting to note that for 77 Cub tilts, WGN-TV shelled out \$75,000 for video rights. The White Sox on the other hand held out for and got a reported \$100,000 for 57 day games. That hundred grand should take care of a substantial part of the Sox payroll.

Now that the '51-'52 basketball season is about officially over, next year let's hope that: (a) the NCAA comes up with a less damaging TV policy towards DePaul and Loyola. (b) Art Morse and the Chicago Stadium land the NCAA tournament finals. (c) DePaul and Loyola successfully organize a Midwest Conference of independents. (d) DePaul cheerleaders earn new and more colorful outfits to instigate more cooperation from their cheering section and (e) Ron Feiereisel, DePaul's star guard, wins the All-American honors he deserves.

Cuffnotes: Con O'Dea, WENR-TV program director, suppressed reports that ABC will televise Ten Day Bike Races in May, by commenting: "So far as I know, bike races are not scheduled for WENR-TV as yet." . . . THE Ides of March are upon us. And to every high school basketball player that means only one thing. Another stormy renewal of that annual March madness, *The Sweet Sixteen*. For four hectic days the top sixteen teams in the state converge on George Huff gym in Champaign, Ill., to match baskets for the coveted state title. And this year television is getting into the act. Station WENR-TV is televising the tense semi-final and final sessions of this colorful event on Sat., March 22.

Play-by-play account of the games will be handled by popular announcer Jack Drees. The games are being carried from Champaign to Chicago via telephone wires through the cooperation of Illinois Bell.

In basketball wild Illinois, the state tourney is regarded as the equivalent of the World Series and the Olympics rolled into one. Every town and hamlet throughout the state entertains grand illusions of a state title for their local charges.

Towns like Paris, Mt. Vernon and Freeport would rest in relative obscurity were it not for their powerhouse basketball teams. And big-shouldered Chicago has never produced a tourney winner. No wonder the downstaters lick their chops at Sweet Sixteen time.

Over the years the state tourney has been the proving ground for many of the country's college stars. The entire first string of the great University of Illinois team is composed of tourney veterans. Such midwest stars as Sammy

Miranda of Indiana, Ab Nicholas of Wisconsin, McKinley Davis of Iowa and Nick Kladis of Loyola all earned their spurs in this prep classic.

Year after year the tourney has provided stirring finishes. Most famous was the climax of the 1942 tourney when future All-American Dike Eddleman led his Centralia mates into the finals against unbeaten and overwhelming favorite Paris.

For three quarters the game followed form and with six minutes to go Paris held a comfortable 30-17 lead. Then the roof fell in. Eddleman and his mates shredded the Paris defenses and finally knotted the score at 33 all. With eight seconds left Eddleman fired a shot from mid-floor which missed. Dike grabbed the rebound and while still in mid-air flipped the ball back through the hoop. Final score: Centralia 35, Paris 33.

The carnival atmosphere in Champaign at tourney time is matched in small towns sprinkled across Illinois. Business stops and radios are tuned into breathless accounts of the tourney's frantic play. And this year Chicago will be able to watch it on television.

March madness may be a disease which Chicagoans will be able to share with downstaters from now on. And the Ides of March are upon us.

This year, the 45th Illinois High School Tournament, under the watchful supervision of B. Floyd Smith, president of I.H.S.A., Albert Willis, executive secretary and other board members, will host some 750 schools. The sixteen teams participating in the State Finals have advanced from 44 districts, 60 regionals and 16 sectionals to represent the cream of Illinois' high school basketball teams. The State Finals were held at the University of Illinois since 1919 but the current classic is the first to be televised.
